- 3 Plot** Literary writing often features a plot structure including exposition rising action climax falling action and resolution
- Characters** Complex and welldeveloped characters with their own motivations conflicts and growth
- Setting** Setting can play a crucial role in creating atmosphere and mood contributing to the overall narrative
