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this book examines mississippi s civil war experience it begins with an introductory overview of the socio political climate of the state during the 1850s and ends with a treatment of mississippi s post war environment and the rise of lost cause mythology in between the work covers the pivotal events issues and personalities of the period wynne emphasizes the experiences of mississippians male and female black and white as they struggled to deal with the crisis the political events leading to seces sion mississippians initial enthusiasm for war voices of dissent the disbursement of troops in and out of the state the home front freedom for the slave community waning enthusiasm both in the military and on the home front as the

war dragged on defeat and the ultimate struggle to turn defeat into a moral victory through lost cause mythology are also discussed this book makes significant contributions to civil war literature

discover more about biloxi s proud history as a maritime marvel and leader in america s seafood industry predating even colonial america biloxi was established for its welcoming gulf shore both a home for traders and a beacon for explorers of the mainland geography made biloxi a historic maritime hub of trade and travel the seafood industry made it a vibrant thriving community thanks to the efforts of a variety of diverse ethnic groups biloxi was dubbed the seafood capital of the world at the turn of the century by the 1920s there were more than forty seafood factories occupying two bustling cannery districts cajuns with deep ties to the region industrious croatian immigrants and hardworking vietnamese émigrés all contributed to biloxi s seafood industry through the civil war devastating hurricanes and shifting economies these hard fishing families have endured building biloxi and forming its character

the seafood industry on the coast of mississippi has attracted waves of immigrants and other workers oftentimes folks who were either already acquainted with maritime livelihoods or those who quickly adapted to the resources of the region for generations the industry has provided employment and sustenance to coast peoples deanne love stephens tells their stories and identifies key populations who

have worked this harvest oyster and shrimp processing were the most significant of these trades and much of the gulf coast s history follows these two delicacies harvesting processing and marketing oyster and shrimp products built the mississippi seafood industry and powered the growth of the entire coastal region this book is the first to offer a broad view of the many ethnic groups and distinct populations who toiled in the oyster and shrimp industries relying heavily upon contemporary newspapers oral histories and interviews to create a rich picture of the industry and its workers the author presents the history of laboring people who daily toiled in factories and often went unheard and unrecognized stephens provides an overview of significant early developments and the beginnings of the industry considering the development of railroad expansion lighthouse construction and ice technology she covers significant state and federal legislation that both defined and protected marine resources illustrating the depth of the industry s importance as mississippians wrestled with adequate protective measures to preserve oyster and shrimp resources throughout the nineteenth and twentieth centuries

few readers of margaret mitchell s gone with the wind remained unmoved by how the strong willed scarlett o hara tried to rebuild tara after the civil war ended this book examines the problems that southern women faced during the reconstruction era in part i as mothers wives daughters or sisters of men burdened with financial difficulties and the radical republican regime and in part ii with specific illustrations of their tribulations through the letters and diaries of five different women a lonely widow with young children sally randle perry is struggling to get her life back together following the death of her husband in the war virginia caroline smith aiken a wife and mother born into affluence and security struggles to emerge from the financial and psychological problems of the postwar world susan darden also a wife and mother details the uncertainties and frustrations of her life in fayette mississippi jo gillis tells the sad tale of a young mother straining to cope with the depressed circumstances enveloping most ministers in the aftermath of the war as the wife of a methodist episcopal minister in the alabama conference she sacrifices herself into an early grave in an attempt to further her husband s career inability to collect a debt three times that of the 10 000 debt her father owed brought anna clayton logan her eleven brothers and sisters and her parents face to face with starvation

rebecca mcombs folwell daughter of william folwell 1787 1870 and huldah lee 1796 1880 was born 17 october 1835 in venango county pennsylvania she married moses s curtis 1823 1879 son of timothy curtis and betsey hurd in 1851 they had three children ancestors descendants and relatives lived mainly in new jersey new york vermont pennsylvania and indiana includes hill prall and related families

in his estimation northerners were just as active as southerners in myth making after the war crafting a cause victorious myth that was every bit as resonant and powerful as the much better known lost cause myth cherished by southerners the north asserted through commemorations the existence of a loyal and reunified nation long before it was actually a fact neff reveals that as northerners and southerners honored their separate dead they did so in ways that underscore the limits of reconciliation between union and confederate veterans whose mutual animosities lingered for many decades after the need of the war ultimately neff argues that the process of reunion and reconciliation that has been so much the focus of recent literature either neglects or dismisses the persistent reluctance of both northerners and southerners to forgive and forget especially where their dead were concerned

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
